Authorisation of motorsport on closed roads

The provision of motorsport on closed public roads has been commonplace for enthusiasts in Northern Ireland, the Isle of Man and the Channel Islands for decades. However, on the mainland of England, Wales, and Scotland, this was only possible by event-specific Acts of Parliament until changes were introduced by the Deregulation Act 2015.

The changes introduced by the 2015 Act make provision, within the Road Traffic Act 1988, whereby motorsport events can be authorised through a procedure prescribed by statutory instrument. Under these arrangements motorcycle events can be permitted by the ACU and car events permitted by Motorsport UK, these being the respective bodies recognised by the International Federations for both.

Legislation governing closed road and motor race orders

Here is a list of the current legislation that provides for running races, speed events and rallies on closed public highways in England, Wales and Scotland, each of which has its own Regulations.

- UK Public General Acts1988 c. 52: Road Traffic Act 1988 Sections 12 to 12I.
- The UK commencement order for the relevant Sections: UKSI 2017:273.
- Regulations for England: <u>UKSI 2017:390</u> Regulation 2.
- Regulations for Wales: WSI 2018:18 (W.8) Regulation 2.
- Regulations for Scotland: <u>SSI 2019:138</u> Schedule 1.
